MLIS programs:


do not provide students with adequate teacher training

BACKGROUND

Information Literacy Instruction at UMD in Fall 2014

- Two groups offering information literacy instruction:
 - ☐ Teaching and Learning Services: ENG101 and FYE
 - ☐ Liaison Librarians: upper level undergraduates
- Librarians in these groups were administratively separated and culturally distinct
- Services from both groups were in high demand, which limited peer-training opportunities


RESEARCH & TEACHING FELLOWSHIP

- 4 to 5 fellows per cohort
- Cohorts overlap during spring semesters
- Work average of 5 hours per week
- Paid \$15 per hour using existing funding lines

RTF 101: ONLINE LEARNING CURRICULUM

OBJECTIVE

Introduction to academic librarianship & information literacy instruction.

- Not-for-credit online course
- Read 2-3 articles per week
- Weekly discussion board post
- ☐ Teaching observations & reflections

RTF 102: TEACHING EFFICACY

OBJECTIVES

Increase instructional competency and confidence.

- Semesterly teaching quota (18-22 sessions)
- Teaching observations & conferences
- Weekly written teaching reflections
- Co-host monthly journal club

RTF 103: TEACHING AS RESEARCH PROJECT

OBJECTIVES

Partner with a subject librarian to redesign or create an information literacy session for upper-level students

- 50 hour Teaching as Research Project
- Bi-weekly discussion board posts
- Weekly written teaching reflections
- Weekly reference shift

BENEFITS FOR LIBRARIES

- improved instruction for first year students
- contribution to the profession
- → community of practice
- partnership with iSchool
- → financially sustainable

BENEFITS FOR FELLOWS

- supportive community
- → teaching experience
- relationships with practitioners
