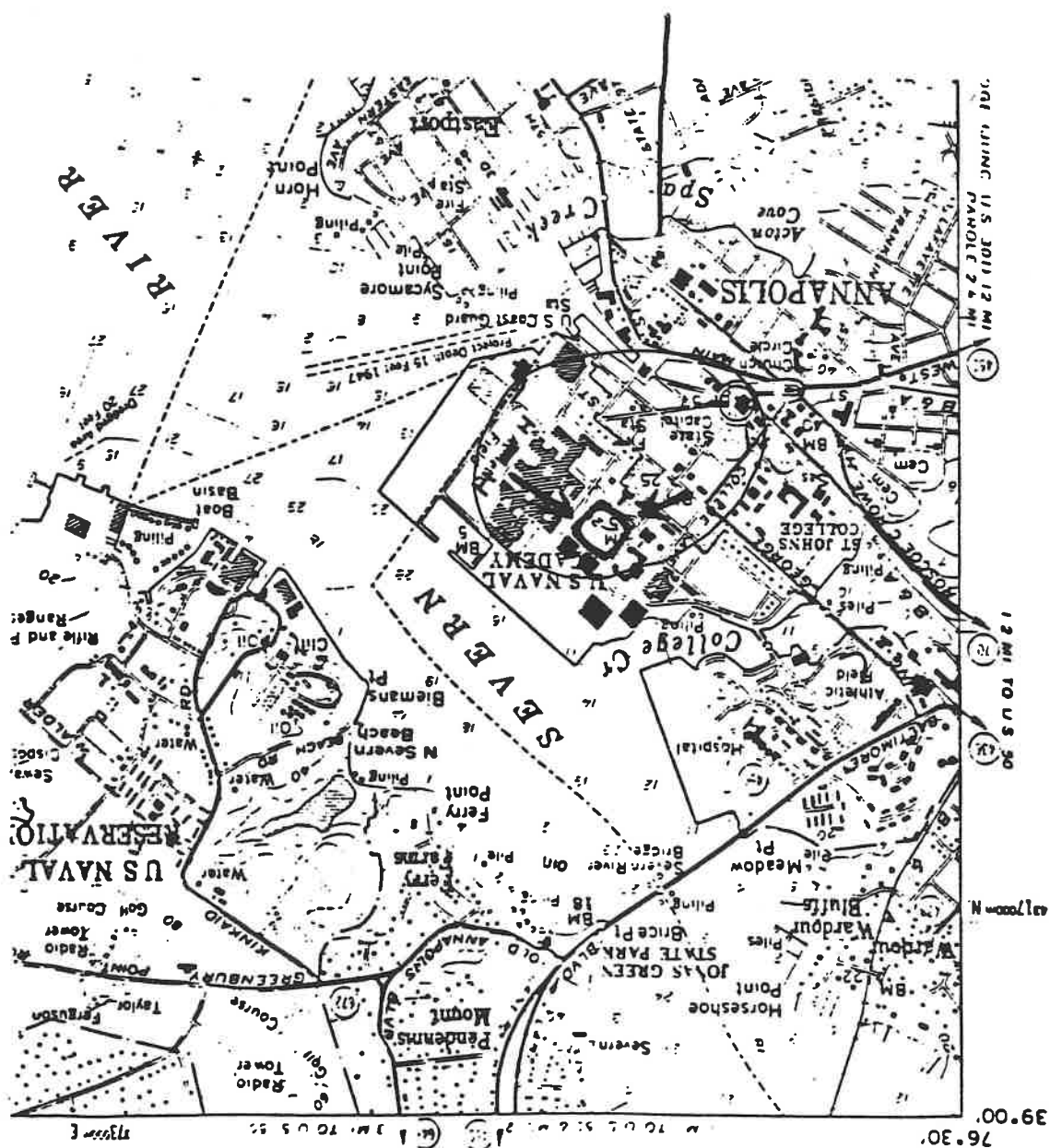

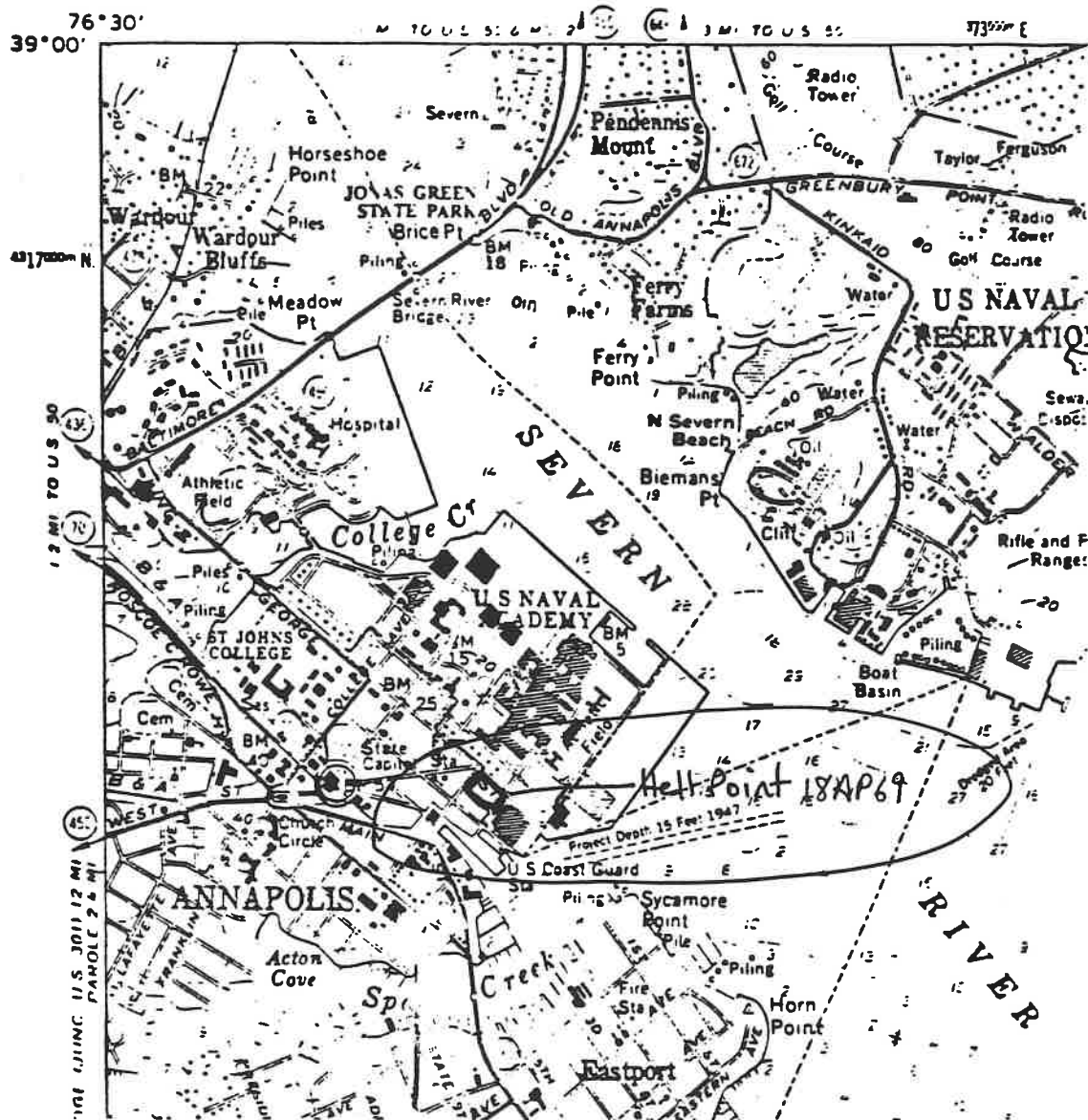

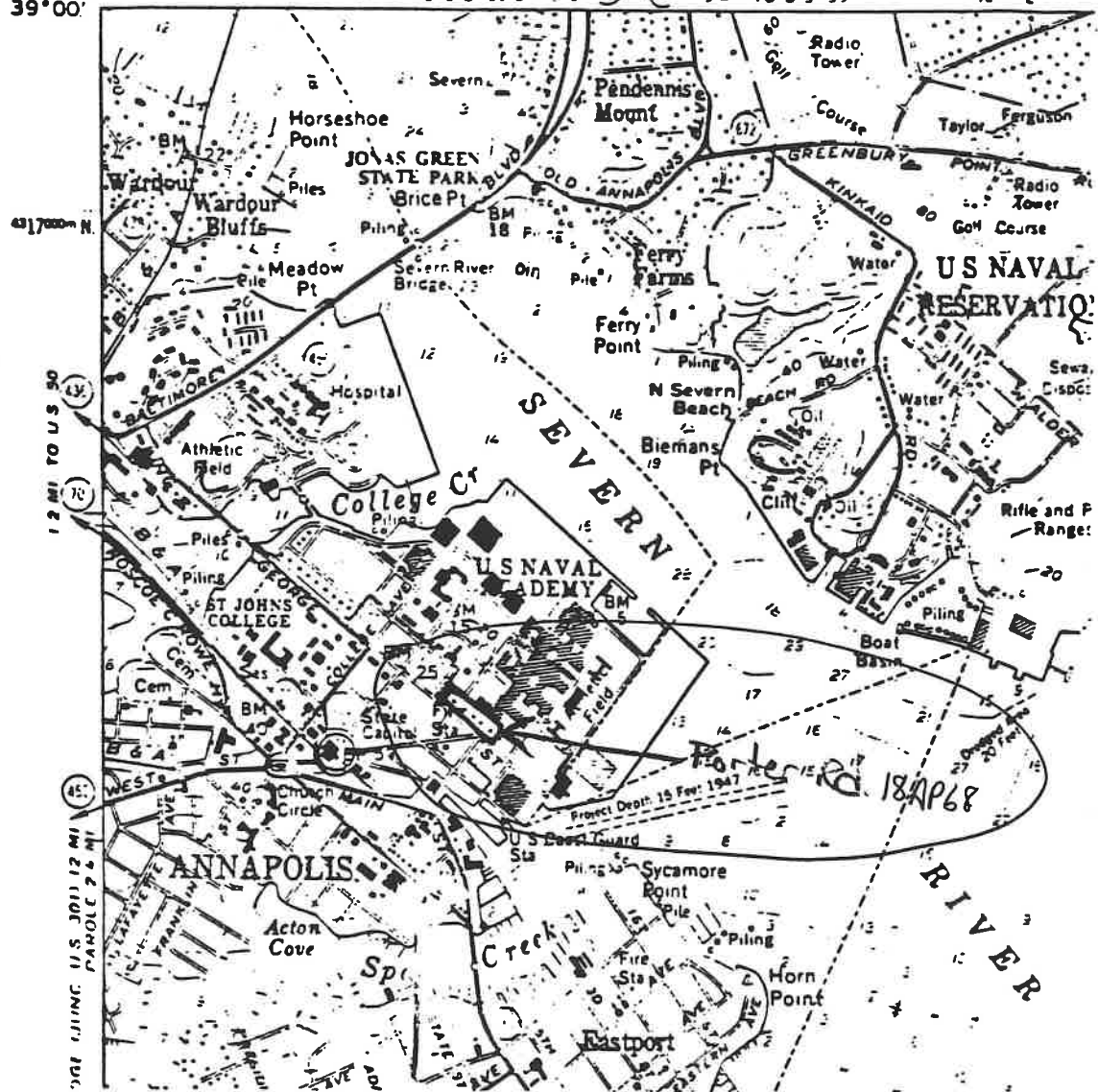

Maryland students 'dig' Naval Academy history

With some assistance from the Historic Annapolis Foundation, about a dozen students in the University of Maryland at College Park are digging up the ground at various sites on the Naval Academy's grassy campus. They arrived in early June with a plan to dig throughout the summer, hoping to find remnants of academy history and earning six college credits for their efforts. Their supervisor, Tom Bodor, is a graduate student at Maryland and an Annapolis resident.

"We're working about 40 hours a week, surveying the area, doing historical research and using the techniques involved in excavation," Bodor said. "Before the excavation began, we looked at old maps and tax inventories to find out what the neighborhood was like before the academy was established. Some of the earliest dental properties date back to the 1700s and now were located on grounds now occupied by Naval Academy Chapel. Another known neighborhood — Hell Point — was located where the Field House now stands."

Exactly what are these archaeologists looking for? "Anything that might relate a bit of history," Bodor said. "In the area between Leahy and Noble Halls, the excavation team found an old toothbrush with the Naval Academy seal imbedded on it. That toothbrush is under examination at a local laboratory. The students found a silver bullet that may date back to the Civil War."

"We found pieces of plaster and mortar about a foot below the ground," Bodor said. "Those

pieces were found in the grassy area between the gazebo and Stribling Walk. It's too early to say for sure, but we're associating these items with the destruction of the Cadet Quarters. The Cadet Quarters were replaced by Bancroft Hall in 1902, during one of the Naval Academy's periods of reconstruction. We suspect that most of the artifacts found here will probably date back to

that time in history."

The Maryland students are also recording oral history, talking with many former residents of the Hell Point neighborhood and the officers' homes located on Porter Road. Hell Point was an integrated neighborhood according to Bodor, and was located from the academy to King George

Street and from the Annapolis City Dock up to the state capitol. The academy acquired a portion of the property in 1941.

The excavation project began as an agreement between the Chesapeake Division of the Naval Facilities Engineering Command, the Naval Academy and the University of Maryland's Department of Anthropology and Archaeology. Funding for the estimated \$50,000 project is provided through a grant from the Legacy Program, according to Cmdr. Tim Equels, assistant public works officer at the Naval Academy.

"The Legacy Program is sponsored by the Department of Defense and was set up to promote conservation and restoration projects for the Army, Navy and Air Force," Equels explained. "Project proposals are submitted from the services each fiscal year. This particular excavation project was selected because it has profound historical significance."

The project is scheduled to continue through the summer with a detailed report on its findings due out later this year.

Academy dig will assist planning

Expansion at the Naval Academy may depend on the past — a history that is being unearthed with picks and shovels.

Several University of Maryland graduate students are digging up remains of the early years of the 148-year-old institution.

"The purpose of this is to allow the academy to plan on how to protect its historic artifacts for the future," said Mark Leone, a professor of anthropology at the University of Maryland.

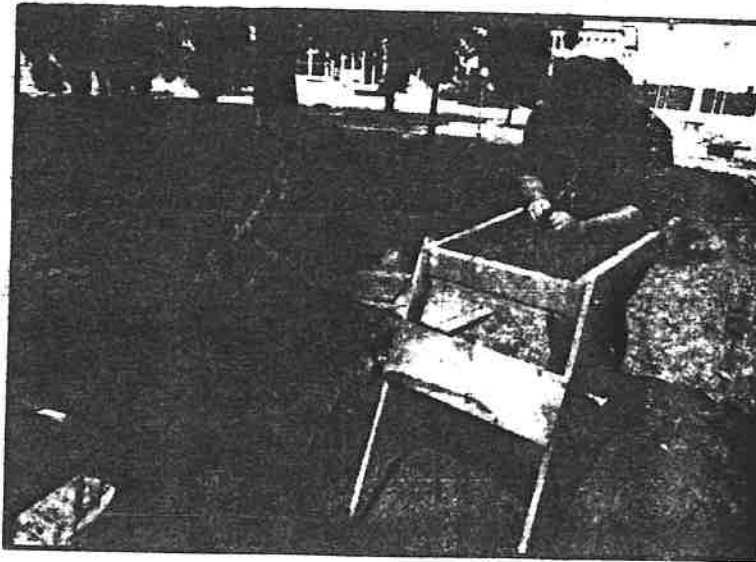
"Now, the Navy knows how to avoid certain spots rich in history when it builds new buildings."

The project is funded by the Legacy Program, a \$50,000 congressional grant awarded to the Department of Defense to protect historic materials on military bases.

"We have a lot of history here at the academy, including significant buildings," said Cmdr. Tim Equels, assistant public works officer at the academy.

"We'll use the information to look and apply it to our master plan," he said. "More importantly, there may be some artifacts to come out of this research that can be displayed."

About a dozen students have been digging a series of pits about 100 feet apart between Preble Hall, the academy museum, and Halsey Field House.

"The area from Preble Hall to Halsey Field House is significant because it was occupied during the 18th and 19th centuries," Mr. Leone said. "The academy is built on land which once held a major portion of the city of Annapolis."

The earliest academy buildings were erected in 1845 when the school was founded on grounds already occupied by the city.

"I reasoned that the academy would have changed things drastically," Mr. Leone said. "When the new academy was built in about 1906, I would think they would have destroyed much of the old academy."

Because of drastic changes to the area, he didn't expect to find much during the archaeological surveys.

"One of the first discoveries we made was that the archaeological record is very intact under the grounds of the academy, just as it is throughout much of Annapolis," he said.

So far, the students have uncovered remnants of what is believed to have been

the original governor's mansion, said Tom Bodor, site supervisor for the project. They have also found what may be the ruins of the old Midshipmen's Barracks, the predecessor of the Bancroft Hall dormitory. Construction on Bancroft began in 1908.

"They found plaster and other building materials, such as bricks, about two feet under the ground in an area called the Ellipse," Mr. Leone said. "We knew in advance that that building had been there."

The old barracks would have faced the chapel, he said.

An old toothbrush inscribed with the Navy seal was also found in the area between Preble and Leahy Halls.

Some 200 plus properties, including several residential areas, were purchased by the federal government between 1845 and 1940 to make up the academy, Mr. Leone said.

"There were remains of the houses at Hell Point, which was located in the parking lot

area on the west side of Halsey Field House, found during the surveys," Mr. Leone said.

Hell Point residents were moved from their homes in 1941 when the federal government purchased the area for academy use.

Digging lasted through last week, with analysis and a written report to follow. A first draft of the report is to be submitted to the Department of the Navy Sept. 1.

The University of Maryland has also been involved in Archaeology in Annapolis, an ongoing research project. Those digs have been conducted in cooperation with the Historic Annapolis Foundation.

HAF researchers helped conduct 19 hours of interviews with former residents of the downtown neighborhood now occupied by the academy.

"We interviewed people who lived in the area from about 1910 until the neighborhood was torn down in about 1941," said Hannah Kaiser, who has a master's degree in anthropology from Maryland.

"What we found is that the neighborhood was predominantly working class and ethnically mixed."

The origins of the name "Hell Point" and the date the area was founded is not known, Ms. Kaiser said.

"We did learn that many of the children from the neighborhood played on the academy grounds, and the midshipmen acted as big brothers to them," she said.

Mr. Leone said the grounds in the Hell Point area are rich in cultural and historical materials.

"This is a major contribution to our knowledge of the history of Annapolis, and will provide the Naval Academy with information on how to plan before it expands," Mr. Leone said.
