The union protested the assignment of workers outside the job classification, which resulted in changes to posted schedules and lost overtime. Two grievances were filed by the union in this case protesting two separate classifications. Due to repairs needed to large number of barges in the company fleet, welder and millwright classification workers were brought into the marine ways (MW) classification to perform duties normally assigned to MW classification. As a result, posted schedules were changed to accommodate the seniority of the workers outside the MW classification. Additionally, overtime opportunities were lost for the twelve (12) grievants' in the MW classification. The union argued that in years' prior, welder and millwrights were never imported to perform repair duties. It was not uncommon to have at least thirty (30) barges awaiting repair due to the company's inability to stabilize the workload and schedule efficiently. Furthermore, the grievants' seniority rights were violated by being supplanted by workers outside the classification. The company contended that seniority rights were not violated based on shared work within the home unit. Additionally, the assignment of particular duties to workers on a given job did not give rise to a local working condition. The board determined that the grievants were already working on a basis more than forty (40) hours per week and the demand for barges would make the workload in the MW classification excessive. Furthermore, the repairs needs were long known; and would not be considered an emergency per contract language. Thus, the scheduling changes were found in violation. Award: split- grievance for assigning outside classification denied. Grievance for posted schedule changes sustained. 




Manuscript Group 226: Sonya Stewart African Americans in Indiana County

Dolores Walker Hickerson and Doris Roberts Taylor were the first African-American students to live on campus. The music majors roomed together two and made many friends, but their lives were different from those of their classmates.

completely realized. Most of the classmates probably didn't know that Hickerson and Taylor couldn't go to the roller-skating rink or that for a time they were not served at a local dairy restaurant. Along with a few of their friends (Janet Kaufman Moxley, Margaret McCluskie Clark, and Joanne Milburn Hopkins-self-described as The Motley years in John Sutton Hall and two years in Crew), they staged what Hickerson now Clark Hall. They did well in their classes calls "the first sit-ins." The suspension of service ended, Taylor reported, when the ollege's president, Willis


would be "off limits" to all the college's students if it didn't serve all the ollege's students.

At movie theaters, ushers motioned for them to sit upstairs. It was nothing new to Taylor, who had grown up in Meadville and experienced similar treatment. "I don't think I had a problem at all at Indiana," she said. "I remember the good things, like my music classes and the gatherings at Charlie Davis's house. College made me grow up. I'd been kind of backward." Hickerson felt differently: "I was offended and hurt by this secondclass citizen treatment," she said. "I aggressively tried to 'make a difference' peaceably, wherever I could."

After graduation, Taylor moved to the Washington, D.C., area, worked eighteen years for the federal government as a secretary, and taught eighteen years in the public schools. She also raised six children and now has five grandchildren.

Hickerson came to Indiana from Altoona and went back there when she graduated. She said she couldn't get a teaching job in Altoona or in outlying areas because of her race, so she worked as a clicker operator at Puritan Knitting Mill and gave private voice lessons for a short period. Later, she taught in the public schools of Philadelphia and moved to Rochester, N.Y. After another unsuccessful attempt at school employment in Altoona, she finally was hired there in the mid-sixties. She called her hiring "justice at work."

Before retiring in 1992, Hickerson taught a total of thirty-eight years, ending her career at New Brighton (Pa.) High School and Middle School. She now lives in Canonsburg, has four children and two grandchildren, and hopes that life is easier for the young African-Americans who come to IUP today. "I really did feel like a pioneer," she said. "We smoothed the way



Map of the Known World, Muhammad a Idrisi, 1154


