"Universal" Truths

- Understanding the question & hurdle
- ♦ Information could be anywhere, nowhere, or everywhere
- ♦ The right tool for the good enough search
 - "Single" or "Meta"
- Advanced "search syntax"
 - Basic
 - Advanced
 - RegEx

Advanced Searching: Universal

- ♦ Use <u>UPPERCASE</u> to do Boolean searching
- Use parentheses to combine search terms
- ♦ Use to have words not appear. They must be the last words
- ♦ Add <u>site:domain</u>
- Filetype: **f** (e.g. f:pdf)
